Loxton Primary School caters for students from R-6. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2024 is 279. Loxton Primary School is classified as Category 4 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 9% Aboriginal students, 9% students with disabilities, 1% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background, 3% children/young people in care. Governing Council Report

2024 has been another rewarding year for Loxton Primary School, thanks to the dedication of our staff and the resilience of our students. Their combined efforts have resulted in numerous achievements, shared through Facebook, Class Dojo, and newsletters to keep families engaged.

A significant milestone this year was the appointment of our new principal, Alana Kitson. She has brought fresh perspectives, focusing on collaboration and student success. We also bid farewell to long-serving teacher and Deputy Principal, Bernie Lipman, whose contributions to education and leadership have left a lasting impact.

Highlights of 2024: Loxton Primary School offered students diverse learning opportunities:

- Assemblies: Including the Reception introduction, student leader induction, Book Week parade, Footsteps Dance, and the End of Year assembly.
- Student Leadership: School Leaders, Sports Captains, SRC and Play Pal leaders took on key roles, demonstrating strong leadership skills.
- **Community Engagement**: Participation in Loxton Mardi Gras, Clean Up Australia Day, and Walk/Ride to School Days.
- **Cultural and Educational Programs**: Premier's Reading Challenge, Reconciliation Week, NAIDOC Week, and Book Week.
- Sporting Events: SAPSASA, Sports Day, Fun Run, Cross Country, and Aquatics/Bike Education lessons.
- Camps and Excursions: Offering valuable learning beyond the classroom.
- Other Events: Book Fair, National Simultaneous Story Time, and Riverland Primary Schools Music Festival.

Fundraising Success: Key fundraising events included:

- ColourFun Run: A vibrant community event in October.
- Easter Eggstravaganza Raffle: An annual favourite.
- SRC Events: End-of-term lunches, themed days like Big Freeze, Footy Colours Day, and Fluro Day raised funds for school projects.

Thank you to all who supported these efforts, ensuring our school continues to thrive.

Building Belonging and Transition Support: Loxton Primary fosters a strong sense of belonging. Our buddy program and transition support for students moving from Preschool to Reception and Year 6 to high school were key. The introduction of a mid-year intake provided flexibility and greater support for new students.

Facilities and Grounds Improvements: This year saw several facility upgrades, including:

- Asphalt Artwork: Local artist Jarrod Loxton expanded play areas with vibrant game boards.
- Musical Bell Siren System: Replacing traditional bells for a calmer school environment.
- **IT Upgrades**: The EMS system, which was implemented from March 2025, enhanced finance and administration processes.
- Junior Primary Playground: A new swing was added, thanks to the Governing Council and SRC.

Academic Achievements: Students participated in NAPLAN assessments, showing resilience and dedication. The results will guide future curriculum development.



Performance Summary NAPLAN Proficiency









Attendance Comment

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or nongovernment school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
